

A MESSAGE FROM FATHER MICHAEL ...

Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

This week begins Holy Week, the most sacred week of the whole year. We are offered two Gospels at Mass for our consideration about our response to Jesus. His triumphal entry into Jerusalem in the midst of jubilation and the waving of palm branches and also the passion and death of our Lord. We're given both ends of the



spectrum to consider. It also helps us to make an honest evaluation of our motivation and our Christian faith. Are we swayed by the crowd and with Jesus when things are going well? Do we persevere with Jesus when our faith places challenges around our status? Do we give in to pressure to allow the crowd to continue to assault Jesus? Is the crowd just a big bully? Yet the crowd does sway great influence in both Gospel passages.

The crowd eagerly cheers for Jesus as he comes to Jerusalem with glory and majesty, but the crowd has a change of heart and leads him to hang on the gibbet of the cross on the hill of Calvary. Their shouts of hosanna turn to taunts of jeers mocking his royalty and divinity. It all changed during a period of just a few days. How willing the crowd was to be persuaded by the authorities to exchange their palms for calls of crucifixion.

Saint Mark's account of the passion presents Jesus as the Messiah who is prophesized in Isaiah as the Suffering Servant. Jesus shares in every kind of human suffering. In the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus expresses sorrow and distress without any support, even from his closest disciples. He suffers denial and betrayal. As he appears on trial in front of religious authorities and Roman leaders, Jesus is mocked and abused. Ultimately though, Jesus is revealed as chosen by God for the mission of salvation.

I look forward to seeing you at Holy Week liturgies. Please join us for Mass of the Lord's Supper on Thursday at 6:30 p.m. with adoration of the Blessed Sacrament continuing until 9 p.m. Good Friday Stations of the Cross at 3 p.m. and the Good Friday Liturgy at 6:30 p.m. Our Easter Vigil will be celebrated at 8 p.m. Easter Sunday Masses are at 8 a.m. and 10 a.m.

Holy Week

Next week we celebrate Holy Week. The events of Holy Week are much more than just recalling Christ's suffering and glorification. We actually celebrate his life and share in his victory. Through his Passion, Death and Resurrection, Jesus accomplishes the mission to which his Father calls him. He conquers sin and restores humanity to the justice of God. This is the holiest week of the year and these liturgies are the center of the entire Christian year!

Holy Thursday marks the end of the Lenten season and we begin to celebrate the Triduum (Latin for "three days"). On Holy Thursday we experience Jesus' gift of himself in the Eucharist, which has been handed down to us. At the celebration of the Lord's Supper, Jesus gives us an image of what the church is supposed to be like. We contemplate Christ in the Upper Room, on the eve of his Passion, as he made a gift of himself to the Church, instituted the ministerial priesthood and left to his disciples the new commandment of love. In this way he wished to remain with us in the sacrament of the Eucharist, making himself the food of our salvation.

On Good Friday we recall the brutal passion of Jesus who suffered so much for our sins and freely gave himself so to open the gates of heaven and prepare an eternal dwelling for all of God's people. Passing over through death to new life defines daily Christian living. We are called to take up our own cross in order to follow Jesus. Life offers so many opportunities to unite ourselves to the cross of Jesus. We venerate the cross to remember that it was our sins that put Jesus on the cross.

The Easter vigil is the grandest liturgy of the entire year celebrating the gift of newness of life. Fire is blessed to illuminate our passage from death into life as the readings are read. Water is blessed to signify our new birth in Christ. New members are welcomed into the church and the initiation sacraments are celebrated. It is truly a wonderful gift to all who participate! Easter Sunday is the day of resurrection and each Sunday we are reminded of Jesus overcoming sin and death and that his resurrection affords hope for each one of us!

PreK

March came in like a Lion with our "All God's Creatures Great & Small "Zoo theme. Our "I Spy with My Little Eye Something Green "theme taught us about primary colors yellow, blue and what happens when you mix them together to create the secondary color green. Our little scientists explored the Lifecycle of a tree and fork printed texture on a cactus craft. Our classroom was filled with joy celebrating Saint Patrick. Students searched the classroom for gold coins to fill our alphabet pot, danced with a leprechaun, and painted a green shamrock with a hint of gold shimmer. Kindergarten

March has been a month of so much growth in kindergarten! In Believe and Read, we've been practicing blending and segmenting CVC words, distinguishing between short vowel sounds, and reading and writing sentences. Students are also working on short story readers, and illustrating those stories. Our letter Ff theme was all about fishing with our friend Frits in the Superkid books. Students heard stories about fishing, played fishing games to practice math skills, and made their own colorful fish creations. Kindergarteners have been working on addition to ten this month, and now they have started subtraction. For science, our unit is on forces, motion, and direction. In one of the lessons, students investigated how pushes can change the speed and direction of falling objects. In the activity, "Boulder Bounce," we played a game where they designed a solution that would protect a model town "Tiny Town" from a bouncing-ball "boulder."
