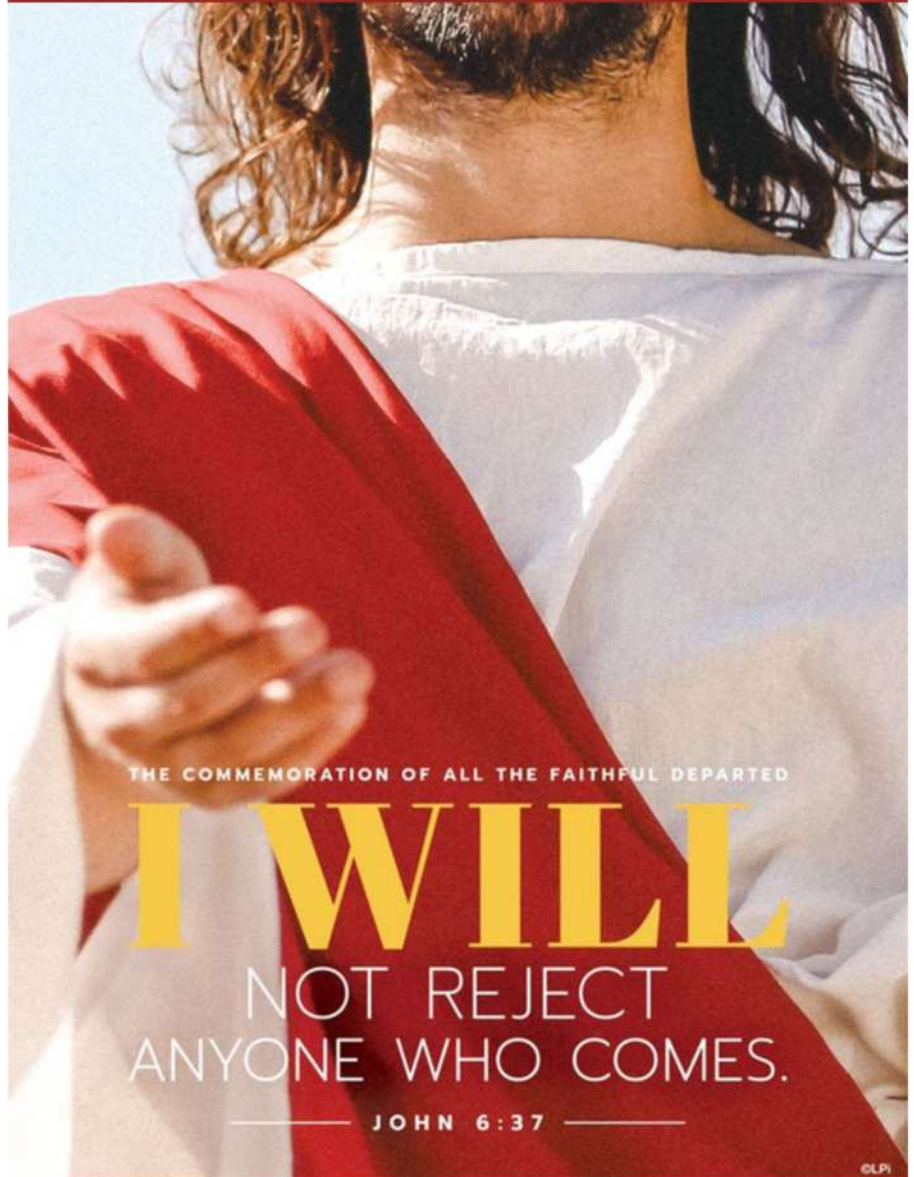

WANT TO SEND A HOLY SOUL IN PURGATORY TO HEAVEN?

All Souls Day, celebrated on November 2nd, is a day dedicated to remembering and praying for the faithful departed. It is a time for Catholics to intercede for the souls in purgatory, who are undergoing purification before entering heaven. The Church teaches that prayers, sacrifices, and acts of charity offered for the deceased can help ease their suffering and hasten their journey to eternal life.

- Visit a cemetery where a loved one is buried and pray for them during the first 8 days in November, their soul will leave Purgatory and go to Heaven.
- One of the most popular prayers that releases multiple Souls from Purgatory is that of Saint Gertrude the Great. She received many visions of Our Lord during her lifetime and expressed to Our Lord Jesus her great desire to pray for the deceased. In return, Our Lord taught Saint Gertrude the following prayer:

Saint Gertrude's Prayer for Holy Souls

Eternal Father, I offer You the most Precious Blood of Your Divine Son, Jesus, in union with the Masses said throughout the world today, for all the Holy Souls in Purgatory, for all sinners everywhere, for sinners in the universal Church, those in my own home and within my family. Amen

- Praying for the souls in purgatory is quite easy. A prayer for the Holy Souls can be as simple as the short Requiem Aeternam prayer:

“Eternal rest, grant unto him/her O Lord and let perpetual light shine upon him/her. May s/he rest in peace. Amen.”

We can also add a brief petition to our daily meal prayer:

“Bless us, O Lord, and these thy gifts...And may the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace.”

Why wouldn't we pray these simple prayers daily?

Total Consecration to Jesus through Mary



This is an invitation to a spiritual journey, a commitment to give your whole self to God through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

This 33-day preparation involves individual daily prayer and reflection. We will meet once a week to watch a video and share with each other. It is a way to grow deeper in our relationship with Jesus, asking our mother Mary to guide us as she guides others toward holiness.

Here's what's happening in the classroom . . .

Preschool

Our students are enjoying new projects each day. This month we have been busy writing, counting and sounding out words. It is always exciting to see the students making new friends, and working together and helping one another. A few themes we have explored are: The season "Fall", we went on a nature walk and found many different colored leaves. Fire Protection & Safety: the students were able to tour the Belle Plaine Fire Station. Nutrition: Learning the food groups, healthy eating, healthy bodies. Harvest and Pumpkins: We talked about the " Life Cycle of a Pumpkin" and were able to recognize the five steps of the cycle (seed, sprout, flower, green pumpkin, orange pumpkin.) We carved a pumpkin using the seeds to bake and taste. With "harvest" we talked about the different kinds of crops, equipment that farmers use during harvest time. Lastly, we enjoyed our Halloween themed fun activities and school parade.

Kindergarten

October has been such a fun and busy month in kindergarten! We've enjoyed many fall-themed projects and activities to celebrate the season. Students created leaf stencil art, decorated scarecrows, and explored pumpkins in creative ways. We went on fall scavenger hunts around our school campus and in the Outdoor Learning Center, searching for both living and nonliving things—sticks, rocks, leaves, pinecones, squirrels, birds, and butterflies and then graphed our findings.

In science, our unit focused on plants and their needs. We learned what plants need to grow and survive and planted our own radish seeds. The students loved checking on their seeds each day and watching them sprout.

In Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, we've been learning about the altar and the important items used at Mass. We have also been exploring the geography of the Land of Israel and learning about important cities like Nazareth, Bethlehem, and Jerusalem, and where they are located on the map.

In Believe and Read, we're learning new letters and sounds each day! We've been practicing how to identify consonants and vowels, listen carefully for beginning sounds, and write our letters.

October was also full of big school events! We participated in the prayer marathon, took a field trip to the fire department for Fire Safety Week, learned about bus safety, and joined in two special service projects including box of joy and the raking service project.

Hello Families,

We have been very busy this month! First and Second graders were out collecting leaves at our outdoor lesson. We looked at the different characteristics of the leaves and had some fun art by making leaf rubbings and leaf people or critters.

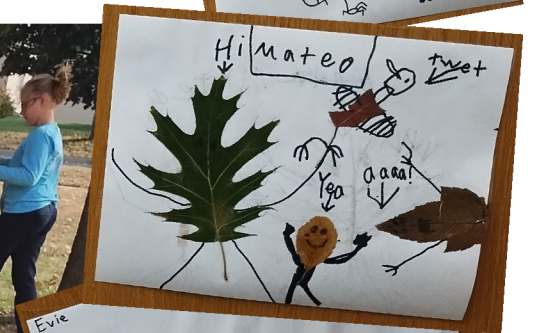
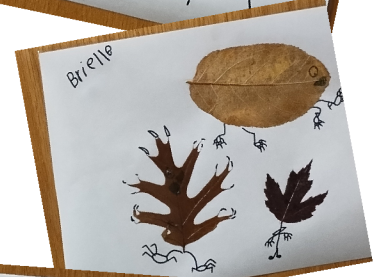
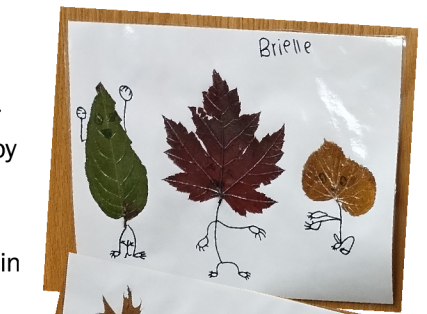
In our first grade religion class we have learned that God loves us and takes care of us. This week we started to learn about loving God and others. Our presentation of The History of God, in the atrium, guides us to understand the creation as a banquet for people to enjoy and see God's great love for us. Second grade has been learning about the Sacrament of Baptism and Confirmation. That we are members of God's family and the Holy Spirit strengthens us.

First graders are getting to know fact families through 10. Second grade has reviewed many strategies to add and subtract within 20. We are working on number patterns (counting by 2, 5, and 10).

We finished our first Social unit about the Government Leaders! We even learned how some of our tax money is spent!

Our science unit is Plant Adventures where we learned how some plant seeds travel and disperse for new plant life to grow. Our reading skills keep evolving at a great pace and it is amazing to hear them read orally in class.

3rd Grade

In mid October Mrs. Eischens began teaching 3rd grade. As a community building project the 3rd grade class explored pumpkins with hands-on activities that enriched their knowledge of pumpkins, as well as strengthened academic skills in reading and math. Additionally, each activity promoted the development of positive relationships, and a sense of unity in the classroom with each other.

In reading, students are learning about the culture of Korea. Students are transferring their new acquired knowledge to intentional writing activities in their journal.

In math students are shifting from addition to multiplication. In math students use manipulatives to help imprint multiplication concepts.

The 3rd grade students traveled to Gustavus Adolphus College in Saint Peter for the SCSC Science and Nature Conference. Students participated in K'NEX race car design, marble maze makers, and the bug show.

In social studies 3rd grade students are formulating theories of how a village 400 years ago disappeared; the mystery of Roanoke.

In religion students are learning the importance of daily devotional prayer, studying Saints, and actively planning school Mass.

6th Grade

Our 6th grade students have been busy learning, exploring, and showing leadership both inside and outside the classroom. Here's a look at what we've been up to this month:

Mrs. Moonen's Stars had an amazing time connecting with nature during our We Are Water and Hook and Cook field trips! Students learned about local water systems, conservation, and fish anatomy — and even had the chance to cook what they caught. These experiences deepened our understanding of the importance of protecting natural resources and appreciating the world around us.

The Stars' trip to Wolf Ridge was truly unforgettable! Students explored forests, tackled the ropes course in the dark, studied wildlife, and built teamwork through outdoor challenges. It was the perfect blend of learning, adventure, and leadership.

Also this month, students attended the Science and Nature Conference at Gustavus College, where they participated in hands-on sessions led by scientists and naturalists. They explored topics ranging from ecosystems and weather to chemistry and physics — sparking curiosity and excitement for the world of science! In the classroom, our Stars are studying chemical changes and the properties of matter. Through interactive labs and experiments, they're observing how materials react and transform, and learning how to identify evidence of chemical reactions. These investigations are helping students think like real scientists — asking questions, testing ideas, and drawing conclusions based on their observations

The Stars made their monthly visit to the Lutheran Home, adding a special touch this time with piano performances by two students. Our Stars continue to brighten this corner of the community with kindness, conversation, and service. They worked on two service projects with the entire school. They also completed the prayer marathon, but got in extra marathon miles. They prayed all the marathon prayers daily for a week, following Jesus' direction to pray unceasingly.

In Social Studies, students have been reflecting on the history and resilience of Indigenous peoples. Through our Native American Studies unit, they are deepening their

understanding of local tribes, traditions, and contributions to our shared history. We've also been exploring early settler life and geography — discovering how communities formed, how geography shapes daily life, and how maps tell stories about the land and its people.

In Language Arts, students are mastering prepositional phrases and crafting thoughtful book reviews. They're learning to express their ideas clearly and analyze stories more deeply, building strong writing and communication skills. Our current curriculum connects with Social Studies as we read stories from the 1960s Civil Rights Movement. Together, we're asking: How might these stories play out today, and what can we as Christians do to protect the rights of our neighbors?



Art

Have you seen the “Starry Night” and Navajo Sand Painting galleries in the Parish Hall? Be sure to check out the amazing student art the next time you are downstairs!

In K-3, our next Famous Artist is Russian painter Wassily Kandinsky, a pioneer of abstract art who had a condition called synesthesia where he experienced sounds as colors or shapes. Students explored this idea of visualizing music in colors, lines and shapes while listening to a variety of instrumental pieces. Be sure to ask your student about the animation of one of Kandinsky’s works! For our studio project, students stamped circles, lines and arcs with black paint and added color with oil pastels while listening to Vivaldi’s “The Four Seasons.”

Our 6th graders recently began their next unit in our Global Art series, Alebrije (ah-leh-bree-he) from Oaxaca (wah-HAH-kah), Mexico. Originally created in the 1930s by an Oaxacan artist based on hallucinations he had while very ill, Alebrije are sculptures of animals and mythical creatures with bright colors and detailed patterns. For our studio project, students are creating clay relief sculptures of fish and adding Alebrije-style details with paint markers.
